Customs and MAF requirements

On arrival you will need to complete both customs and Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry (MAF) requirements before you can officially enter New Zealand. MAF is responsible for agriculture, horticulture and forestry, safe food, a protected environment, the wise use of the land and the creation of clean, green product. MAF protect farms and wildlife from imported pests and diseases by minimising the number of foreign pests and diseases entering New Zealand.

You will be required by law to declare any food or organic material you are carrying. It is important not to ignore this as significant fines can be given to those who do.

Please use the final itinerary provided in your media pack on arrival in New Zealand. This will include any adjustments and additional contact details crucial to your itinerary

Maori Culture: A Warm Welcome

Nau mai, haere mai, whakatau mai ki Aotearoa, te whenua pōtiki o te ao whānui

(Welcome to New Zealand, the youngest country on earth)

Thanks to immense pride in their heritage, Maori people have kept their identity and language alive and today it's this unique culture that provides visitors to New Zealand with an experience unlike any other in the world. Manaakitanga (hospitality) and generosity are important values for Maori. These traits are synonymous with tourism and are evident in the increasing number of Maori tourism operators around the country. The renaissance in Maori tourism has also opened up lesser-known parts of New Zealand to international travelers.

Itinerary

Begin in Eastland, where Te Reo Maori language is commonly spoken as part of daily life. Using Gisborne as our base, hear the stories of Paikea, brought to life in the movie *Whalerider*. Then fly to Auckland, known as Tamaki Makau Rau the maiden with a hundred suitors. It is a region long fought over in Maori history and it doesn't take visitors long to discover why the area was so coveted. We'll hear the stories of this landscape on a Maori walking tour, and visit Waiheke Island to experience a traditional hangi feast and sleep in a marae. Traveling north we'll visit the Bay of Islands, home to the beautiful Treaty Grounds in Paihia, where the founding document of this bi-cultural nation was signed. We'll paddle a waka through tidal estuaries of the Waitangi River to the sacred Haruru Falls. Then explore the mighty kauri forests on Northland's west coast and meet Tane Mahuta—the lord of the forest, a kauri tree estimated to be 2,000 years old. A night tour with a Maori guide will leave us with a reverence for the magnificent trees that dominate this landscape.

Difficulty Rating: EASY

Story angles:

- Maori culture.
- Maori society today.
- History of New Zealand.
- The divergent landscapes and cultures of Eastland, Northland and Auckland.

Unique photography opportunities:

- At the waka and marae in Paihia, Hone and his group will dress the part-a wonderful photo op.
- Additional Maori photo ops but a few instances when "no photos" will be requested (such as during greeting at Time Unlimited).
- The Bay of Islands represents some of the North Island's most resplendent scenery.

Components requiring some exertion:

- Paddling wakas (canoes)—fairly easy and no experience required.
- Tamaki Hikoi excursion involves some steep walking on dirt paths.
- Footprints Tour in the Waipoua Forest is on flat ground but it involves a couple of hours of walking.

Special clothing or gear participants must bring:

- Light clothing appropriate for paddling.
- Rain jacket and cool-weather clothing for nighttime forest walk.
- Bring a T-shirt for crafts project at Time Unlimited marae stay on Waiheke Island.
- Walking shoes for Tamaki Hikoi and Footprints Tour.

Join Anne to discover Gisborne and the East Coast and follow in the footsteps of our country's first inhabitants. Since the thirteenth century our shores have been welcoming visitors. The first Maori explorers landed in Turanganui a Kiwa (Gisborne) over 700 years ago and it is also the first landing place of Captain James Cook and the crew of the Endeavour.

Known in pre European times as Turanganui a Kiwa, Gisborne, was the landing site of two very important Waka. (Canoe - sea going vessel). The Horouta Waka and the Endeavour, the ship navigated by Cook. These two waka forged history for the region known as Te Tairawhiti but also to the birth-place of a new Nation.

Hear the history of the people of the Horouta and be shown the areas of their occupation.

Te Toka a Taiau (The Rock of Taiau) was the mooring place for many waka and considered to be a very important fishing spot. The rock no longer visible was blasted away to make way for the development of a harbour in 1877. The rock itself was the place where Maori and European first greeted each other with the hongi (pressing of noses, symbolising the breath of life). A place and time in history that should never be forgotten it is where two peoples first met and is of importance to all New Zealanders.

Te Poho a Rawiri

The Marae stands at the foot of Titirangi maunga (Gisborne's mountain) and is the most important and historical whare rūnanga (meeting house) of the region. When building and construction of Te Poho-O-Rawiri Marae was completed in 1930 under the leadership and guidance of Apirana Ngata, it was reputed to be the largest meeting house ever built in New Zealand. Te Poho o Rawiri is named after the ancestor Rawiri Te Eke Tu O Te Rangi who on behalf of his people signed the Treaty of Waitangi (New Zealand's founding document).

The richly decorated interior incorporates many noteworthy features, the more unusual being interior alcoves and stage, quite radical for the time.

Our guests from SATW will experience a powhiri (traditional Maori welcome) and the famous process of nose pressing or hongi before moving through to the dining room for morning tea.

Once our SATW guests have been welcomed onto the marae they are considered to be whanau (family). Meaning that when they return to the marae in the evening they will be whanau (family) welcoming additional guests on to the marae. Our SATW guests will therefore experience a traditional powhiri.

1130

Depart Te Poho O Rawiri Marae with Anne and drive up the East Coast.

Hear the story from the descendants of Paikea the Whale Rider in Whangara Mai Tawhiti. This small village is rich in legend and history. The movie Whalerider was filmed at Whangara. Be spellbound by the intricate carvings of the Whitireia meeting house, that serve as a whakapapa (genealogy) for the people who can







connect their lineage to the house. Hear stories of our Tipuna (ancestors) that gave them rise to notoriety; hear of their heroic deeds and of the not so heroic deeds.

Hear why the Waho te Rangi meeting house is so different to Whitireia meeting house. These stories will educate you and give you more understanding of why these Whare Nui (Big House) are unique.

1400

Arrive at Dive Tatapouri and enjoy lunch. After lunch Dean and Chris will take our guests out onto the reef to hand feed wild stingrays.

Hand feed wild stingrays at Dive Tatapouri

Stingrays are beautiful and graceful swimmers, gliding like flying carpets of the ocean floor. These flattened-out fish are related to sharks and have a distinctive, sleek tail with sharp spines on it. Stingray mouths are conveniently located on their bellies, so when they find something, in it goes. If a stingray eats a clam, it eats it whole, crushes it up, and then spits the shell out.

Tairawhiti Museum and Art Gallery, Stout Street

Tairawhiti Museum and Art Gallery has a reputation as one of the most innovative regional museums in New Zealand. A new regional history exhibition, Watersheds: Nga Waipupu, changing programmes of contemporary and historical art, exhibitions by local artists & travelling exhibitions. The exhibition forms a river that flows through the history of Tairāwhiti. Beginning with Maori accounts of how the world began and where people came from, this river of history finishes in the ocean of the present, next to the bustling city of Gisborne, Tūranganui-a-Kiwa.

Tairāwhiti, which means the coast or tide of the shining sun, is located on the east coast of the North Island of New Zealand. For the purpose of this exhibition the region extends from Wharekāhika, or Hicks Bay, in the north, to Paritū in the south. Tairāwhiti has been shaped by the rivers that flow from the inland mountains to the sea.

The museum is both museum and art gallery to the Tairawhiti region. Endeavouring to reflect ancient and recent histories, a variety of changing and semi-permanent exhibitions are on offer to the visitor.
